All of the listed values are important; however, some are more foundational and therefore require more priority.

Over the last few months SJM has narrowed this to a single area for maximum impact: the issue of pre-release vocational/professional training and certification/licensing for incarcerated women and men in Colorado.

Ultimately, increased attention to training and certification involves transforming the culture of incarceration from a system of retribu-

tion and punishment to a culture that supports and encourages emotional, spiritual, and vocational development, consistent with our values as a Christian community.
